S650 Ford Mustang Production Will Not End in 2028

With the 2023 UAW strike over, both Ford and the union have started to focus on the future of their respective organizations. For the union, that involves <u>organizing plants</u> belonging to non-unionized automakers. For The Blue Oval, its immediate priority is getting production at plants impacted by the strike back on track, so it can set itself up to close out 2023 as strongly as possible. Additionally, the automaker is currently ramping up production of the S650 <u>Ford Mustang</u>, with the 2024 representing the first model year of the redesigned pony car. Although the current generation is still in its relative infancy, several outlets have recently reported that its demise may arrive sooner than expected, based on a UAW document highlighting Ford's future investment strategy for every plant located in the United States. But even a cursory glance at the document reveals that the S650 very likely has a future beyond the current contract.

At the very least, S650 Ford Mustang production will continue through April 2028, which is when the UAW contract recently ratified by Ford workers will expire. There is nothing in the text of the document that remotely suggests that Flat Rock Assembly will cease to produce the current generation in 2028, and it's not clear why certain individuals were stymied by it. The purpose of that particular section of the UAW Ford agreement is to outline what commitments the union was able to secure from Ford, and to summarize the automaker's intentions for every assembly plant that falls under the agreement. It's entirely possible that the company's plans will change, but as of this writing, S650 Ford Mustang production is not ending in 2028, and the agreement is our best and most official source that it will continue, at minimum, through the first quarter of that



Beyond the UAW agreement with Ford, all other information related to the future of the S650 Ford Mustang is unofficial. As *Ford Authority* previously reported, some outlets have <u>stated</u> that the current generation could go away <u>as early as 2029</u>. But earlier reporting that cited suppliers suggests an <u>eight year production run</u> for the S650, which would mean it could continue being produced into the next decade, with an end date of around 2031.

That said, it's entirely possible that the S650 Ford Mustang will be the <u>last gasoline-powered pony car</u> to be sold by the automaker. This summer, Ford CEO Jim Farley surmised that a fully electric Mustang would be <u>less palatable</u> than a hybrid variant, a possible hint that the future of the muscle car lies in partial electrification. Beyond that, the future is murky and uncertain, and there is no indication that the recently introduced model will be produced for a relatively short production run of five years.

Ford Mustang Rivals Chevy Camaro and Dodge Challenger No Longer in Production

As Blue Oval fans are well aware by now, the iconic Ford Mustang just entered its brand new S650 generation with the launch of the redesigned 2024 model. Set to be produced at least through April 2028, according to a UAW document, the Ford Mustang continues to enjoy success in a quickly shrinking market of V8-powered, rear-wheel drive cars with available manual transmissions. While one Mustang rival – the Dodge Charger – will reportedly continue to be offered with an ICE powertrain when the next-generation model arrives (albeit the twin-turbocharged 3.0L I-6 Hurricane engine, not a V8), production of the sixth-generation Chevy Camaro ended this week, marking the demise of yet another Mustang rival, according to GM Authority.

GM originally announced that the sixth-generation Chevy Camaro was set to bow out of its lineup following the 2024 model year, and at the same time, revealed that it would be sending that model out with a special Collector's Edition package available throughout the lineup. However, it seems as if the 2024 Chevy Camaro is enjoying a rather short production run, as the last example reportedly rolled off the assembly line just yesterday.

Regardless, GM reportedly decided to extend 2024 Camaro production following the onset of the UAW strike in September, though that was done to ensure that it could fill all remaining orders for that model. Previously, production was slated to end in early December, but was ultimately extended exactly one week.

While this marks the end of the sixth-gen Camaro, GM did note that the nameplate will be resurrected at some point in the future, though it's unclear what the next Camaro might look like or be powered by. With GM committing to EVs, many believe that the sporty model will be reborn as an all-electric offering of some sort, or perhaps even an entire sub-brand with a range of models sporting the Camaro name.

The all-new S650 generation Ford Mustang just launched a few months ago, and as Ford Authority previously reported, will continue to be produced at the Flat Rock Assembly plant at least until April 2028 — which is when the new UAW contract with the automaker is set to expire. The same cannot be said of the pony car's rivals, however, as production of the sixth-generation Chevy Camaro just ended with no successor yet announced, while the Dodge Challenger will live on in some capacity, though it's somewhat in the same boat. Now, production of the current-gen Dodge Challenger has officially ended, according to Automotive News Canada.

The current-gen Dodge Challenger has been in production at the automaker's Brampton, Ontario plant since 2005, where it's built alongside the Chrysler 300 and Dodge Charger. However, production of all three of those models is ending today, bringing that rather long run to a conclusion, even as the Charger and Challenger, specifically, continue to perform well in terms of sales and profitability for parent company Stellantis.

With this change, Stellantis is also bidding farewell to its Brampton plant for a while – which will transition to building electrified vehicles in a couple of years – as the next generation of the as-yet-unnamed Dodge muscle cars will take place at the nearby Windsor Assembly plant. It's unclear what those models may be named, what they might look like, or what might power them, but some recent reports did provide a little clarity on that situation.

In addition to an all-electric Dodge muscle car, the brand is also reportedly working on an ICE version of that same model, albeit one powered by the relatively new, twin-turbocharged 3.0L I-6 Hurricane engine – not a V8 of some sort, it seems.


