Ford Motor Company has filed to trademark "Boss" with the United States Patent and Trademark Office (USPTO), *Ford Authority* has learned.

Filed on January 15th, 2025, under serial number 98963540, this application contains the goods and services description of "Motor vehicles, namely, gasoline and electric passenger automobiles, sports cars, pick-up trucks, sport utility vehicles and their structural parts."

As always, thank you for your continued support and enthusiasm for our community. Let's make this March a month to remember!





The Ford Authority Take

Boss is a rather well-known name among <u>Ford Mus-</u> tang fans, given the fact that it was first used on the now-iconic Boss 302 to meet homologation requirements to compete in Trans Am racing, leading to a production version offered to customers in 1969 and 1970. The Boss 429 followed as an even more powerful variant also designed to serve as a homologated model for NASCAR racing, but after 1970, both Boss Mustangs disappeared for a pretty long time – in fact, the Boss 302 didn't return until 2012, when it once again graced the flanks of a track-focused pony car.

Following that limited run, the Boss Mustang has been on ice ever since, but this new trademark filing seems to indicate that The Blue Oval may in fact be bringing it back in the near future. Such a move would make sense for a number of reasons – for starters, Ford has done the same thing with other special Mustang variants like the Shelby GT350, GT500, and Mach 1 in the past, and we're certainly due for a new Boss.



Secondly, as *Ford Authority* exclusively reported in May 2024, the S650 generation Mustang <u>may not utilize the</u> <u>Shelby name</u> on any variant, though no final decision had been made at the time of that report. This stems from the fact that Blue Oval executives are fans of using names conceived by Ford, rather than those licensed from third parties like Shelby. The Raptor and Dark Horse are good examples of this, and both have thus far experienced a healthy amount of success. If a new Boss Ford Mustang is indeed in the works, it would also be the perfect time to use it to pay homage to Howard Freers – a man that played an integral role in developing the original Boss 302 – but <u>passed away last year</u> at the age of 97.

Chief Ford Mustang Architect Hal Sperlich Dies At 95

The Ford Mustang is currently celebrating 60 years of existence, and over those six decades, the popular pony car has certainly earned its place in automotive history. We can credit a handful of people for having the vision to make the Ford Mustang both a reality and a tremendous success, but sadly, some of those folks have passed away in recent years. That list includes the man known as the "father of the Mustang," Lee Iacocca, who passed away back in 2019, as well as Gale Halderman, who drew the rough sketch that would eventually become the original pony car that passed away in 2020. Now, we've lost another important figure in Ford Mustang history.

That man is Hal Sperlich, as first reported by <u>Automotive</u> <u>News</u>, who passed away yesterday at the age of 95. Sperlich began his career at The Blue Oval in 1957 as an engineer fresh out of college but quickly made a name for himself by showing the ability to quickly spot trends within the industry – such as the need to downsize vehicles, which eventually got him fired by CEO Henry Ford II himself.

Before that happened, Iacocca was the catalyst that Sperlich needed to make his vision become a reality, fighting back against bean counters that influenced product development heavily. The two were able to convince brass that the Ford Mustang was a machine that Americans wanted, and he was certainly correct, as the pony car proved to be an instant hit when it launched. Sperlich went on to become vice president of Ford of Europe, during which he played a big role in creating the Fiesta.

However, it was Sperlich's next project – a small, frontwheel drive van – that would ultimately seal his fate at The Blue Oval. After pushing hard for that vehicle to become a reality, Ford II fired him on the basis of not wanting to spend money on an unproven segment at a time when the company was in dire financial straits. However, Sperlich moved on to Chrysler and wound up saving that company by creating not only a minivan, but also an array of small cars. Today, we remember Sperlich as a truly revolutionary figure in the automotive world as a whole, as well as one of few people that were instrumental in bringing the Ford Mustang to life.

Bright Clothing May Trip Up Crash Prevention Sensors: Study

From driver assist systems to crash prevention, modern vehicles are getting smarter. Well, sort of, anyway. It's difficult to program a computer to predict and respond appropriately to all sorts of stimuli out on the road, and a recent study found a rather interesting flaw in crash prevention systems. They might get confused by people wearing bright colored clothing.



The <u>study</u>, which was performed by the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety (IIHS), found that crash prevention systems may fail to recognize people dressed in bright colors – an ironic development, considering that lighter hues tend to be more easily recognizable to human drivers.

Specifically, the study examined the crash prevention systems in a Honda CR-V, a Mazda CX-5, and a Subaru Forester. Researchers conducted multiple trials with an adult-sized dummy dressed in a black sweatshirt and pants, a retro-reflective jacket with black sweatpants, black sweatshirt and sweatpants with retroreflective strips attached to the limbs and joints, and a white sweatshirt and pants. Tests were conducted at 25 mph without roadway lighting and 10 lux of illumination in a crosswalk. The study found that the vehicles, especially the CR-V and CX-5, struggled to recognize the reflective strips, either failing to decelerate sufficiently when it detected the dummy or simply not decelerating at all. The systems had an easier time detecting the dummy dressed in all black but performed better in low-light situations. When dressed in all white, the systems varied in performance, but failed to adequately slow, except for the Forester, which slowed completely. The Forester and CX-5 each slowed sufficiently when the dummy was dressed in the reflective jacket; the CR-V, however, did not respond at all.

"These results suggest that some automakers need to



tweak their pedestrian automatic emergency braking systems," said IIHS President David Harkey. "It's untenable that the clothes that pedestrians, cyclists and roadway workers wear to be safe may make them harder for crash avoidance technology to recognize."

Ford was not included in the study, but it has struggled with its driver assist features in the past. BlueCruise, the automaker's advanced driver assist system, <u>was rated</u> <u>poor</u> by the IIHS last year, and the NTHSA recently <u>opened an investigation</u> into the system after two crashes were reported.

2025 Ford Mustang GTD Lineup Pricing Revealed

It's been well over a year since the <u>Ford Mustang</u> GTD debuted, but since then, we've only learned more and more about what will be the very best-performing factory pony car to ever exist across that model's 60 years on this earth. However, one piece of important information that we haven't yet received is just how much the Ford Mustang GTD will cost, at least, aside from the model's \$325,000 base price. Now, we're learning more about what folks interested in fancier versions of the GTD will be required to shell out.

According to sources familiar with the matter, the Ford Mustang GTD Carbon Series will start out at \$428,000, while the Spirit of America has an MSRP of \$429,00 – prices that don't include any options. As *Ford Authority* exclusively reported just yesterday, deliveries of the 2025 Ford Mustang GTD <u>are slated to begin in Q2</u> – not Q3, as some other rumors have suggested. However, those that are privileged enough to take delivery of a new Mustang GTD will be <u>required to keep it for two</u> <u>years</u> – just like the Ford GT that preceded it, as *Ford Authority* was the first to report.

For that extra outlay of cash over the base model, Ford Mustang GTD Carbon Series and Spirit of America buyers will get some unique equipment and features. The <u>Carbon Series</u> is available with a unique hue dubbed Chroma Flame, along with an unpainted hood, roof, and rear Tech Deck, Magnetite wheels, available body color or contrasting painted stripes, and Grabber Blue, Race Red, or black-painted brake calipers, plus the Performance Pack as standard equipment.

As for the Mustang GTD <u>Spirit of America</u>, it pays homage to legendary land speed racer Craig Breedlove with a Performance White exterior featuring Race Red and Lightning Blue racing stripes, which join exposed carbon fiber elements including the front splitter, rear diffuser, and rear spoiler – the latter of which features Race Red end plates and "Mustang" script. Owners can choose between exposed carbon fiber or Race Red mirror caps, but Race Red calipers and the Performance Package are included as standard.

Ford Mustang Mach-E NASCAR Prototype Officially Revealed

Over the past couple of years, Ford has churned out a handful of what it calls <u>EV demonstrators</u> – one-off builds that are designed to push the limits of what's capable in terms of all-electric performance. These vehicles give the automaker the perfect test bed for its future EV technology, and at the same time, have also resulted in some motorsports victories as well. That includes tremendous success at the Pikes Peak International Hill Climb, but this year, The Blue Oval has unveiled something totally new – the Ford Mustang Mach-E NASCAR prototype.

The all-new Ford Mustang Mach-E NASCAR prototype is interesting for a number of reasons, starting with the fact that it's a coupe – a body style that its road-going namesake isn't currently offered in. However, as *Ford Authority* previously reported, the EV crossover <u>may gain</u> <u>a coupe version</u> as part of its upcoming redesign, according to a prior report. Aside from that interesting tidbit, this new EV demonstrator features the same sort of wild bodywork as its predecessors, such as a gigantic rear wing, giant air intakes, and various aero tweaks throughout.

FoMoCo hasn't revealed too many details about the Ford Mustang Mach-E NASCAR prototype otherwise, but did mention that it utilizes three electric motors, a 78-kWh battery pack, a full carbon tub, and the same suspension, brakes, steering, and wheels as the automaker's current Mustang Cup Series cars.

The new Mach-E NASCAR prototype joins a host of other notable EV demonstrators from the recent past, including the Mach-E 1400, SuperTruck, <u>SuperVan 4.2</u>, Super Cobra Jet 1800, and <u>Ford F-150 Lightning Switchgear</u>, to name just a few. The SuperVan 4.2 wound up scoring a win in the open class and setting a new record at the 2023 Pikes Peak International Hill Climb, while the F-150 Lightning <u>recorded the quickest time</u> and brought home a win at the 2024 Pikes Peak race, too.

5 Good Reasons to Track the Time Spent on Your Project

When I got serious about restoring my old **Range Rov**er, I decided to track the time I spent doing so. My stint as a restoration shop manager opened my eyes to how many hours go into a quality restoration. And while I'd resurrected several cars in the past, none of them was as involved as this one would be.

I built a spreadsheet to manually record each day's progress (even if it was often only two days a month). I've recorded my time religiously for the year and a half I've been working on it. Each entry lists a start time and end time, as well as an overview of the work performed. At this point, I have just under 200 hours logged, roughly five weeks conventional work weeks.

I have a long way to go, and sometimes it can be tedious to make the entries with a sore body and greasy hands. But I've found value in doing this little exercise and thought others might do the same. So here are my five good reasons to track your project time.

Accurate Project Planning

Understanding how long certain tasks take helps you better estimate timelines for future projects. This can help avoid underestimations or frustration when deadlines slip. For example, if removing and rebuilding an engine took 30 hours, you'll know to allocate similar time for that task in the future.



Get in the habit of making handwritten notes at the time of work

Budget Management

Time is a resource just like money. Tracking it helps you assess the true cost of your restoration, including the labor you've contributed. If you've spent 1500 hours restoring a car, you can factor your time's value into the project's overall worth, especially when comparing DIY to professional restoration costs.

Skill Development

Knowing how much time you spend on specific tasks (e.g., welding, painting, wiring) highlights where you're improving and where you might need more practice or education. If bodywork took twice as long as expected, you might need to refine your techniques or invest in better tools.

Documentation for Resale or Show Purposes

A detailed log of your time spent on the project adds credibility and value when showcasing the car at events or selling it to a fellow enthusiast. Buyers or judges will appreciate knowing that 500+ hours went into meticulously restoring every detail of the car.

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Periodically enter notes in the digital spreadsheet for a permanent legible record

Personal Satisfaction and Motivation

Seeing the hours accumulate provides a tangible sense of accomplishment and can motivate you to complete challenging phases of the restoration. Reaching milestones like "100 hours on paint and bodywork" can boost morale and keep you focused on finishing the project.

It's a minor sacrifice to watch the clock and make notes, but don't stress over every last detail. I round my time to one decimal point and make broad, general comments about the work. Get the major details in there and you'll be doing fine. If you're feeling up to, <u>download and print my spreadsheet</u> below and

start recording your next project. It may just be an eyeopener.
